Advent and Christmas at Our Lady of Dallas bring the end-of-semester rush, countertops spilling over with sweets and fruits, visits to families and friends, our own abbey traditions and the opportunity as a community to reflect on the Word Made Flesh once long ago and daily in our own lives.

This year God has blessed us beyond our imaginings with the "appearance" of nine young men in the monastery, seven novices and two newly professed junior monks. Br. Kolbe and Br. Nathaniel, the two newly professed monks, join Br. Barnabas taking philosophy and theology courses at UD in preparation for ordination to the priesthood. To expose them to the energy and joy of the Prep School boys and to help them in their ongoing discernment, they are also teaching: Br. Barnabas, Physics II to the seniors; Br. Kolbe, Latin to the First Formers; and Br. Nathaniel is introducing the boys in Form II to the intricacies of English grammar in English Lab.

Fr. Bernard Welcomed Home!


