



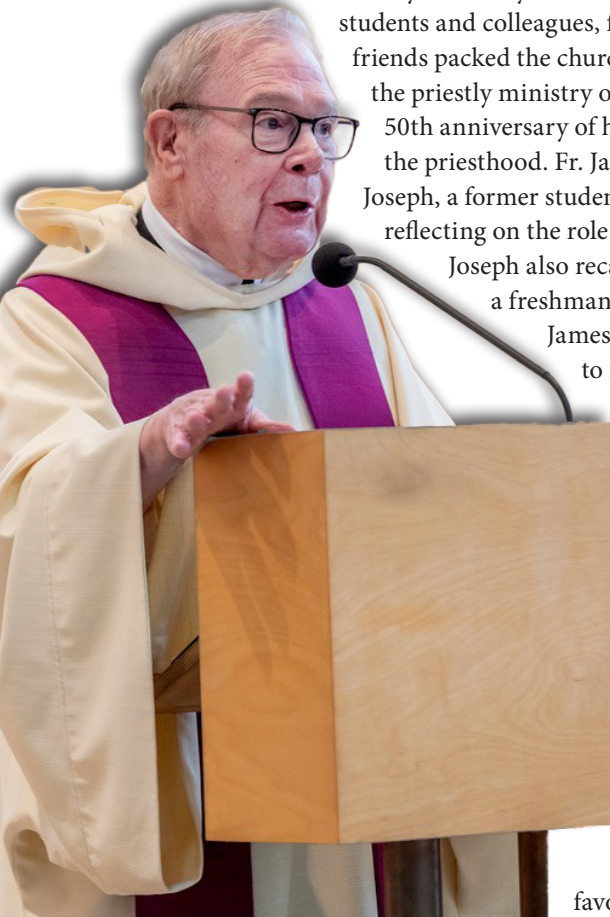

In late December, four Cistercian nuns visited us here in Dallas. Sisters Zita, Judith, and Henriette are from the Cistercian Abbey in Kismaros, Hungary, while Sr. Diane is from the Cistercian Abbey in Boulaur, France.



Together with several monks, the nuns attended SEEK26 at the Gaylord Texan, where some 5,000 college-aged men and woman prayed, worshipped, and attended conferences. Fr. John and Sr. Diane spoke to a packed conference hall about healthy friendships between men and women. As Sr. Diane



pointed out, "It is unthinkable that a world framed only by men or only by women could be good."

One evening was dedicated to music. Sr. Judith played the harp, Sr. Diane taught the monks to sing a Latin hymn in four-part harmony, and Fr. Francis and Br. Gideon joined the sisters on guitar.

A Texan in Hungary

With the encouragement of the monastic community in Dallas, Abbot Peter sent Fr. John back to Europe to continue his mission of discernment and support for the renewal of Cistercian life in Hungary. In the spring, Fr. John will continue serving the Cistercian schools by offering a friendly presence, celebrating the sacraments and speaking about the spiritual life. He will also continue to serve as a vocations director and formator for the young men currently interested in Cistercian life at Zirc. In addition, plans are in progress to open a discernment house next year in Budapest — the “Brenner House” named after Bl. John Brenner. The goal of the house is to welcome young men open to the priesthood and interested in living in an intentional community rooted in common prayer and fellowship as they discern their vocations.

A Hungarian Witness

Dr. Tamás Sulyok, President of Hungary, took a goodwill tour of Hungarian emigre communities in the United States this March. As part of it, he stood in the Cistercian Preparatory School lunchroom and said to the gathered crowd of Hungarian Americans:

“I have a personal and special connection to the Cistercians. My uncle was a Cistercian monk. I benefited from the Order’s suppression in Hungary, as it gave my uncle more time for the younger members of the family, including me. It was from him, Father Ignác, that I learned the basics of faith, religious knowledge, and much more. His human dignity is still an example to me today. He was always understanding towards other young people and me. He was a caring, open-minded, and loyal teacher. So, through him, I also consider myself a Cistercian student.”

Great indeed is the power of Cistercian education! It is gratifying to think that lives squirreled away on rustic land beside the Trinity River can nourish future generations of leaders to serve many, many others. President Sulyok’s reminder of the Cistercian gift in his own life is especially moving because it centers on his gratitude not for his (considerable) secular competencies or even on the grounding power of familial attachment, but on the way his uncle’s presence brought him the light of Christ, the true guide to life and the revelation of the meaning of all things. It is, after all, for the love of God and the salvation of humanity, not for worldly respect, that we pursue Christ in monastic life and holy orders. Every person God sends us, whether a first former or a novice brother or a congregant at Sunday mass, is a unique and unrepeatable microcosm of divine creation, a whole living world suffused with love and dignity from Our Father above. Every time someone comes back to tell us that we have had a hand in their rescue or blessing, it is a wondrous gift of the Holy Spirit.

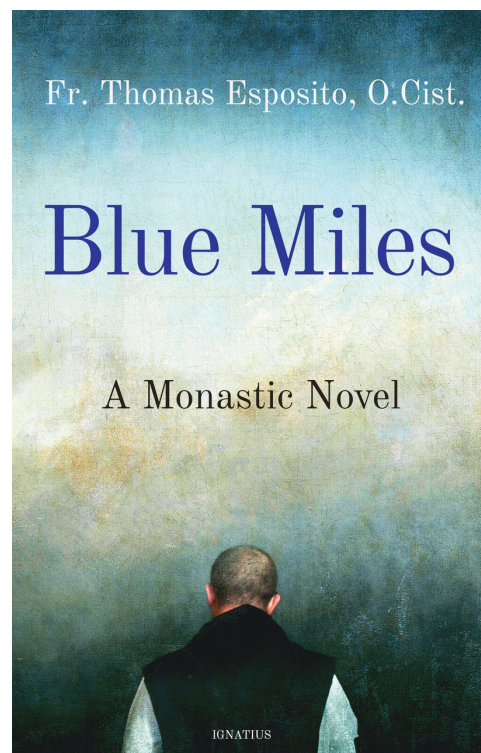
